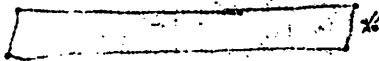

Additional Supporting Documentation

The Package Travel Program for Klamath County Project funded the initial phase of creating itineraries for ten themed tours to be marketed to tour operators. Group, or packaged travel, is an underdeveloped segment of Klamath County tourism and the goal of project was to start laying the groundwork from which the potential of this new market could begin to be realized.

This project entailed:

- Identifying the tourism strengths of Klamath County
- Developing and writing descriptions for ten tours based on those strengths (enclosed)
- Designing detailed itineraries for each tour that range in duration from 4 to 13 nights in Klamath County
- Creating a password protected website (www.tourcraterlake.com) to promote the itineraries to tour operators.

As you can see from the itinerary descriptions that accompany this report, the tours that have been put together make excellent use of all of Klamath County and the many attractions and venues to be found here. The next step for this program will be the marketing of the itineraries at the National Tour Association trade show during the 1st quarter of 2015 and begin booking tours.

Arts and Artisans®

Whether this is the first or the last experience your guests have of the Pacific Northwest, they will find the familiar is now unique the ordinary is now special and the usual is now surprising. Birdhouses that are motor homes, creating your own beading designed purse, paper becomes your own origami art, forest floor flotsam into one of a-kind baskets and wall hangings. Many of these multi-talented artists have branched out into diverse areas of the creative arts.

Many of the area artists, from quilters to painters enjoy offering lessons to visitors and will help the creative side of your group emerge much to their delight. Even the non-artistic members of your groups will enjoy the hands on experiences.

The Ancients ~ The carved petroglyphs and painted pictographs tell of human lives inseparable from the land. These can be observed today in the same area as they were discovered.

The Recent History ~ The Modoc War is probably the most well known in Oregon as has its famous characters. Captain Jack, General Canby, Hooka Jim, Colonel Davis and Rev. Eleazar Thomas are just a few of them that you will meet in the itinerary being offered.

The Preservation ~ Local museums and art galleries have on display artifacts, paintings, photographs and written histories relating the stories.

The Sacred Sites ~ Even today, one can visit the sites that these people still hold sacred. Crater Lake and the Lava Beds are two of the most famous.

The history of this culture is as important today as it was many years ago and the Native Americans of the Klamath Basin are working to keep it alive. We are honored to be able to tell their story.
